As hard as it was on the church family to lose three of their own, the emotional toil taken on Pastor Joel had to be immeasurable, and yet, he still greeted everyone on Sunday morning with a smile. God bless you, Pastor Joel, and may God give you strength and renewal to continue caring for your flock. October is Pastor Appreciation Month. Pray for our Pastor and all ministers every day.

Jesus said, "Do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God, believe also in me. In my Father's house there are many dwelling places. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, so that where I am, there you may be also." (John 14:1-3, NRSV) There were three Keezletown UMC members who died at the end of September: Wayne Ryman, Wally Simmers, and Maynard "Pop" Sites. There were three funerals in one week: Monday, Thursday, and Friday. There were three meals at Keezletown UMC for grieving families and friends: fried chicken, mac n' cheese, macaroni salad, potato salad, seven-layer salad, green beans, slaw, rolls, sweet tea, cookies, brownies, and more. Geraldine is an octogenarian and helps lead the Meals Ministry at KUMC which regularly helps with funeral meals. I called Geraldine several times that week to see if the Meals Ministry and Geraldine could help with each meal. Every time Geraldine said, "We can do it." Geraldine called volunteers, helped with the menu, was usually the first to arrive to help with the meal, and one of the last to leave. That is a quite a heavy load. After the first meal, I asked Geraldine, "How are you feeling?" "I'm tired," Geraldine replied. When I asked Geraldine other times that week, I got the same answer. I understood. I was tired, too. I was amazed again and again at Geraldine's faith and sharing the love of Jesus that week. Not only by Geraldine's, but everyone who helped the Meals Ministry. Again and again people replied that the church could make room, provide food, and share grace. Jesus' words above from John 14 promise that God has plenty of room for us. Not only room, but that Jesus prepares a place for you and me. Jesus not only prepares a place, but will even take us right to God's house, kingdom, and eternal life so that we do not have to fear or be afraid. Let us rejoice in how

God has room and makes room for Wayne, Wally, and Pop through salvation in Jesus Christ. God has made room for every sinner to repent and be forgiven. Jesus has come to seek out everyone lost and take us home. The Holy Spirit fills us with the presence of God and empowers us to live in faith in the church and the world. May we find joy in this making room grace of God, believe in Jesus and follow the ways of Christ's love, and make plenty of room for others to experience the mercy of God. Jesus' words above are a promise. As God made room for us in the earth, Jesus also makes room for us in the Father's house. There are many rooms. God is not running out of space. ARE YOU A STUMBLING BLOCK? On the last Sunday of Sept, Sept 26th, we gathered as Diana played "Anywhere With Jesus", "Tell It to Jesus", and "What a Friend We Have in Jesus", and the bell rang. Ryan carried in the Light of Christ as Diana played "I Must Tell Jesus" for the prelude. Pastor Joel greeted all in attendance and via video and gave the opening prayer, followed by the Church family singing "Wonderful Words of Life". All were invited to join the choir in singing "You Are the Seed". Diana read the Gospel lesson from Mark 9:38-50, the casting out of demons and stumbling blocks. Pastor Joel then gave the offertory prayer and the closing Benediction using "A Prayer of Francis of Assisi". 
"MISS MABLE": On September 26th, 2021, Jim Harris presented a devotional in the Upper Room and wishes to share it with all who did not get a chance to read it. Read Matthew 19:13-15. The scripture is "Start children off on the way they should go, and even when they are old that will not turn from it." Proverbs 22:6. "After nearly 70 years I still have a clear memory of the nursery class in my childhood church. Miss Mable made the Bible stories come alive for us. She let us help tell the story as we placed felt-backed cutout figures of Bible characters on a board covered with flannel. When she told us the story of Noah and the ark, we loved deciding where to place the lions and donkeys and other animals on the ark. I am eternally grateful to Miss Mable for patient, loving instruction. But her love for each of us was even more important and helped us begin to understand the unconditional love of God. When I was struggling with my faith as a young adult, I remembered the love of Miss Mable and the other people in that church. On a return visit, I was warmly welcomed. My life was transformed by seeing the gospel lived out in others' lives. Prayer: Thank you, Lord, for children. Guide those who teach them with your love

and grace. Help us to encourage and support others who lead children in learning about Jesus. Amen."

CHARGE CONFERENCE: KUMC held its' annual Charge Conference on Sept 28th at 7:00 p.m. in the Church social hall via zoom with the district. Seven church members attended and Pastor Joel presided over the Keezletown meeting. Dist Supt Dr Victor Gomez gave the Welcome and Gathering and the Opening Prayer, followed by a short Meditation entitled "Your Will Be Done" taken from a passage in Jeremiah that means we are to reach out with love and good news. Decisions need to be made by seeking God's will. We must relinquish control and follow Him. He then showed a video with falling plates, shattering into pieces, and then being reassembled, showing that we are each different, with different pieces, broken and shattered, but that Jesus came to save and that His love can put us back together. We then sang "There is Power in the Blood". Each charge was then dismissed to their own conference. Pastor Joel welcomed all present and Dale via zoom. Diana Davis was approved as Secretary for the meeting, and all were asked to sign the attendance sheet before leaving. Lay Leadership Nominations were approved. The following Lay Speakers were all approved: Steve Morris; B J Smith; Ken Thomas; Len Williams; Mac Coffman; and Dale Dodrill; Rev David Nankivell was recognized as a retired minister who assists KUMC when needed. We were asked to pray for those considering becoming a Minister. Under Clergy Compensation, the Pastor's salary was approved; the Pastor's Accounts Reimbursable was approved; and the Pastor's housing parsonage allowance was approved. Lay leader, Steve Morris, spoke about KUMC's mission and moving forward, stating that God has remained the same through the pandemic and the mission of the church is still the same and needs to move forward. "AND HE TOOK THEM UP IN HIS ARMS". Today, Oct 3rd is World Communion Sunday. As we gathered, Carol played "Give Me Strength O Lord" and "Autumn Song", and the bell rang. Sweet little Nora Grace carried in the Light of Christ as Carol played "In Autumn". Ken Thomas, assisting Pastor Joel, gave the greeting, and opening prayer, after which we sang "Tell Me the Stories of Jesus". Nora Grace, along with Grandpa Neil, came again to read the Gospel lesson from Mark 10:13-16, Jesus blessing the little



children. Jesus keeps stressing the importance of "Receiving Little Ones", the title of today's message. Pastor Joel continued with those who accept little ones, accept Jesus, and receive God. Children were not important, the least, the bottom of the heap, but Jesus told the disciples to stop and let them come to Him. If we cannot receive little ones, we cannot receive the Kingdom of God. <u>UMW DISTRICT MEETING</u>: On Oct 7th, Cheryl, Chris, Carolyn, Sherry, Karen and Pastor Joel attended the Harrisonburg District UMW's 48th Annual Meeting at Otterbein UMC. District President, Barbara Phillips, called the meeting to order with announcements and reciting of the Purpose. District Treasurer, Joy Utberg lit a candle to burn for 36 minutes in honor of the \$1,309.50 collected. Emily Bender of Church Wide Services presented a program about resettlement of refugees coming to our area by providing housing with food and furnishings, clothing, health screenings and programs, employment services, registering children for school, cultural orientation and immigration services. She spoke on ways the community could get involved by volunteering or making donations. After the program there was a short meditation and the "Hymn of Promise" was sung. Those members who had passed away during the year were remembered. Minutes were read, the 2022 budget was presented and the offering was blessed. Awards were presented and KUMC received Living Into Our Purpose Gold Unit and achieved Five Channels of Mission Giving. Chris Cole received a Reading Program Award for completing 17 books. Under new business, our own Sherry Summers, District Nominations Chair, announced the appointment of the new District Treasurer, Mary Jane Rawley, who was installed by District Secretary, Sharon Harold. The meeting was then adjourned.

WELCOME HOME, JIMMY. Children's Sabbath, Oct 10th, was a celebration of children, "Undie Sunday", and Jim Harris returning to KUMC to speak. The service began as Diana played "Kum Ba Yah", "Marching to Zion", "Onward Christian Soldiers" and "There Is a Fountain Filled With Blood" as the gathering music, and the bell rang. Ryan Sprague carried in the Light of Christ as Diana played "I'll Go Where You Want Me to Go" as the prelude, and then Pastor Joel gave the greeting, and opening prayer. Ryan Sprague, as Special Music, presented with a swollen lip from a bee sting, and a three fingered guitar presentation because of a jammed finger, a lovely rendition of "Wide, Wide River to Cross". This year the painting is titled, "Sharing is Caring". As I was picturing the little community of Bethlehem I was picturing a place not unlike Keezletown, a place where it would soon be



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known if a baby had been born to travelers in a stable - or a garage. And there is no doubt that caring women from the church would reach out to that family to see how they could help. Here's the official artist statement: " This is not meant to be "The Three Wise Women." though they are wise. More importantly, they are caring. As I imagine it, the news of a baby being born in a stable quickly spread throughout the small village of Bethlehem, and along with it came gossip, speculation and suspicion. These three women saw a need and decided to fill it. Because of their life experiences and familiarity with being poor or distrusted they wanted to help this young family. One brought a jar of fresh water, having no idea that baby Jesus would grow to give others "living water". Another brought fresh baked bread and clean strips of cloth for swaddling the baby who would one day say, "I am the bread of life". And the third one brought a basket of fruit especially overflowing with grapes for the one who would come to say, "I am the vine..." They could not know that thirty years later Jesus would kneel and wash his disciples' feet with water, then share in the Passover meal using the bread and the wine as reminders of his sacrifice that was to take place on the cross. They only knew there was a need and they wanted to fill it. This is why we give to the Society of

St. Andrew. There is a need, and we can help. When we truly care about the needs of others, we naturally share what we can to help them, no matter who they are or why they are needy.
