WHAT IS YOUR CROSS? As we gathered on Nov 14th, we entered to "My Hope is Built", "There Shall Be Showers of Blessing" and "Love Lifted Me", and the bell rang. Diana continued with "I Want to Be There at the Roll Call" as the prelude and Ryan carried in the Light of Christ. Pastor Joel gave the welcome and announcements. Linda Liskey came to thank the men who cleared the brush and trees at MCCCC on Nov 13th (article in Nov issue). Pastor Joel continued with the opening prayer and the church family sang "We Gather Together", followed by the choir singing "How Can I Keep from Singing". Carson Guilliams came to read the morning Gospel lesson from Luke 9:23-27, take up your cross and follow me. Our very own Barrett Bowman, who has returned to Keezletown, came to give the message entitled "My Journey". Barrett began by explaining for those who didn't know, how she was part of KUMC, talking about Patti and Terry, Ken and Faye, Brandon and Ginny, and Michele and Scott, and then told of her own children and granddaughter, and that she hoped she did not put us to sleep as she was not used to speaking to a group of adults. In fact, this was a first, so she'd worn light clothing, in case she sweated; she'd moved her glasses, so she couldn't see us, and that her message was in large print. Everyone laughed. She remembers studying in Sunday school class in the old EUB church and looking through holes in the floor and thinking it was cool. They would always go to church with grandma Mariam, and she became active in the youth group, attending retreats, trips to Hershev park, collecting newspapers, and carwashes to make money. She was baptized at 13, and her favorite Bible study was at Allene Clatterbuck's home, where they could discuss book by book with friends. She then began working at Port Republic as a part-time vouth advisor, which has led to 20 years working with youth. The youth are her children. Looking for a fulltime job, and after 2 rejections, she questioned her direction until God placed a cross of sticks in her yard to reassure her. Linden Heights Baptist, even with a pay cut, was the answer. She worked with low-income families; had to go to court with a few; counselled many; had to report child abuse; met with parents; babysat troubled youth; attended weddings; and even a birth. In Sept 2021, she left LHB and began assisting in ESL at SHS and is taking educational classes to continue in teaching. "I'm a fixer", she said, and by working with ESL students she cannot fix them all at once, but she can work with them one by one by just talking to them and sharing God's love. She reminded us that we can do anything with God's help. The message was followed by the singing of "Take My Life, and Let It Be", the

Jim Dillard then came, as a proxy for Dale Dodrill, to read the following letter from Making Cards for our Troops: "Dear Card Makers at Keezletown UMC, Thank you for your donation of beautiful handmade cards. HOW FAR DO YOU HAVE TO MOVE HIM? November 21st was Christ the King and Thanksgiving Sunday, and we gathered to Carol's playing of "Pilgrim's Song of Hope", "We Gather Together", and "Thank Offering", before the ringing of the bell. Paul was stoning Christians while Jesus was in his head, but he did not know Him until the road experience. Paul prayed for Christ to be in his heart. There is 18" from your head to your heart. Until Jesus moves from your head to your heart, we haven't really grasped the gospel and retained the power Paul talks about. Your mind can know honey is sweet; people can tell you; books can tell you; but until you taste it, you really don't know. Taste the honey, so you can know it fully. Have you heard the saying, "He has a foul mouth"? Well, the words that come out of the mouth, come from the heart. What is in the well of the heart will come up thru the bucket of the mouth. The Lord looks inside (thank you, Jesus). Keep Christ in the center of your heart. When you think about the measure of God's love, with Christ in our hearts, only then we will be able to measure the depths of God's love. In Revelation, Jesus stands at the door and knocks. Let Him in and move the 18 inches to your heart. "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name" was sung before Pastor Joel led the Morning prayer and Lord's prayer. He then acknowledged the generosity of the Church family in supporting Operation Christmas Child with 116 shoeboxes, which he blessed. The Fourth Servant Song, for the Holly and the Ivy, was presented by Chloe and Pastor Joel Robinette, then hung on the altar rail. Karen Mooney and Sharon Martin then sang, a cappella, "The Holly and the Ivy". The Mystery of Incarnation, the Blessing of the Chrismon Tree, and it's lighting, was presented by the Dillard family (Jenny, Haiden, and Leigha), followed by the 1st verse of "O Come, All Ye Faithful". The choir then sang "O Christmas Tree", with one verse sung a cappella by Sharon Martin in German. Mary said yes, Elizabeth said yes, Joseph said yes, the shepherds said yes, and the foreign wise ones said yes. We can share that small hope

with others in small giving, caring ways to bring Christ to the world. The branch is different from the Christmas tree. Doug Akers, a former pastor at KUMC, wanted a real tree, so with permission from the Suter's, he and Dale Dodrill proceeded to cut down three trees before he found the right one. Pastor Joel and Jenn have found that a prelighted artificial tree has helped their marriage. Put the tree up, take it down, and put it in a box out of sight. The Branch of Jesus, God's promise, is a living branch that grows for the whole world. We need to hang a hope that we each have on Jesus. Spend time in prayer with the three songs of promise at Christmas: the Song of Zachariah, the Song of Mary, and Simeon's Song. During Advent, find a hope, and pray. Pastor Joel then led the Morning Prayer, the Lord's Prayer, and the Offertory prayer, followed by the Doxology. The closing hymn was "Lo How a Rose E'er Blooming", before Pastor Joel gave the Benediction, Nora Grace carried out the Light of Christ and Diana played "Deck the Halls". **HANG YOUR HOPE ON JESUS.**
