## **OUR PASTOR CHATS**

Easter greetings to you all. Christ is risen! Christ is risen, indeed! I am writing this on the second day of Easter Season which is also known as the Great Fifty Days. It is a joyous time of celebrating Christ's resurrection, appearances, ascension, and Pentecost. It is a season that reminds me that from any suffering, rejection, or death like Jesus' on the cross, God can bring resurrection and nothing can separate us from the love of God in Jesus Christ (check out Romans 8!). There is a heaviness upon my heart though because there is a tearing apart happening in our United Methodist Church. There are many who will be leaving the United Methodist Church beginning May 1, 2022 to join the new Global Methodist Church and it looks likely that there will be a years-long timeframe of annual conferences, congregations, pastors, and laity departing the UMC for the GMC. One of my pastoral concerns is that when churches split up or close it is never a clean break. For a visual, take a piece of dry spaghetti and hold it at the ends and break it in half. You will find it breaks into more than two pieces. It is similar when there are splits in the church at any level—some stay, some leave for another church, some drop out of church altogether, or take a step back from church involvement due to the issues of strife around splits. Our Virginia Annal Conference of the UMC will be working with congregations and pastors that plan to leave for the Global Methodist Church. These are surely the times for us to live our faith that Christ lives and reigns over all. These are times to pray for one another. This is not the time to tear down the body of Christ but to build up the people of God across the whole church (not just the local congregation or denomination). There will be people with many questions, anxiety, and anger over this time of tearing apart in the UMC. May Jesus give us grace to continue in faith to love God and love our neighbors as we do ourselves. We do serve the risen Christ who comes to heal, save, forgive, and make us one. When the United Methodist Church is splitting apart it is evident how much we still need the ways of Jesus. It calls me to humility and repentance and asking for others for prayer. Please be praying the United Methodist Church, the Global Methodist Church, and the Church. Our hope, life, and faith is in Christ Jesus our living Lord. Let us seek Jesus and build up each other in Christ's grace. Pastor Joel

Amy-Jill Levine again talked from inside the temple about the Sadducees questioning Jesus about the divorced lady; the widow's giving; and what is the greatest commandment. Dollar bills were laying on the tables to begin the discussion on the widow's giving.

4th Lent Service: Pastor Joel welcomed all to the 4th Wednesday night Lent service on Mar 23rd, and invited all attending to come and enjoy a delicious loaded potato bar with homemade gingerbread and lemon sauce for dessert, prepared by the Neil & Carol Sacra family. The service began with the singing of "O, How I Love Jesus", accompanied by Carol on the piano, and a prayer for our speaker, Rev Al Tuten, from Mt Zion UMC. singing "Break Thou the Bread of Life". Neil came to read the gospel lesson, but first thanked Pastor Joel for using pictures from his family Bible as the bulletin covers. He read from Luke 23:13-31, Jesus sentenced to death and the crucifixion. Pastor Joel began his message entitled "The Crowd Was Shouting, "Crucify", by telling us this scripture tells us about the day of Jesus' death and four different people: Pilate, those shouting, Simon of Cyrene, and the weeping women. Pilate seems to be in charge and wants to release Jesus, repeating His innocence three times. He flogged Him instead and released Barabbas. He gave into the crowd shouting, "Crucify". What would you do, knowing someone is innocent? How will you handle peer pressure? The people crying out preferred Barabbas because he killed the Romans. Jesus taught them love, not revenge. Do we prefer Barabbas who rids us of our enemies, or what Jesus offers? Jesus, after being flogged, fell carrying the cross beam and Simon of Cyrene was commanded to carry it and follow

Jesus. Our crosses seem to be too much, but we have Jesus to help us carry them. The women of Jerusalem are weeping and wailing for Jesus as He went by them. Jesus told them to stop weeping for Him and to weep for Jerusalem, for those that might reject love, and those who would not believe. Do not weep—resurrection is coming for Jesus, and for all who believe. The Church family then sang "O Love Divine, What Hast Thou Done" and repeated the Affirmation of Faith. Along with the Prayer Time, we were given the Invitation, the Confession and Pardon, the Offertory Prayer,



and the Doxology was sung, before the Lord's Prayer was recited and the Great Thanksgiving was given. For the first time in a very long time, we were invited to the altar to accept the bread and drink from small cups. (Those who did not feel comfortable still had the premade sacraments to partake in their pews.) Pastor Joel and Ken served those unable to come forward. Pastor Joel gave the

benediction as Ken carried out the Light of Christ and Carol played "All Glory, Laud, and Honor" as the postlude. IT FELT GOOD TO COME TO THE ALTAR.

We also were treated to special entertainment from "The Jammers" from Linden Heights Baptist Church who sang for us: "The Old Country Church", "I Cannot Tell", "The One Who Died for Me", "Til the Storm Passes By", "Gone", and "For Those Tears".
