OUR PASTOR CHATS

Last month I wrote from the Virginia Annual Conference but we were not quite finished. In addition to what I wrote last month, here are some more highlights from the 2022 Virginia Annual Conference which was June 16th - 18th in Hampton, VA: Rev Tom Berlin was approved to be an episcopal candidate endorsed by our conference, meaning he could be elected a bishop at the next Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference in Fall 2022. Tom is a gifted communicator, has been the pastor of several congregations in our conference, been a General Conference and Jurisdictional Conference delegate many times, and has written several books based on some of his sermon series. Three congregations disaffiliated from the United Methodist Church this year at our conference and more are expected to do so. Bishop Sharma Lewis has formed Team Jeremiah to assist congregations looking for answers about why congregations are disaffiliating and what is the disaffiliation process. Online at https://vaumc.org are resources from Team Jeremiah including two webinars which share a lot of information. During our Saturday session there was a motion to redirect some funds from the budget to children and youth programming in our conference. While that request was too late to be considered as part of the budget people began pledging funds so that \$66,200 total was pledged and our own district superintendent pledged \$1,500 from our district, so we may get a chance to help with that in the future. The last count I have seen for the Virginia Annual Conference Offering was \$122,000 which will benefit several ministries like our Partnerships of Hope and the Doctor of Ministry Program at Wesley Theological Seminary for Military Chaplains to benefit their ministry. Thank you to everyone who gave to the VAC offering this year. It was such a blessing to see people from our conference I have not seen in person for several years. It is inspiring to see people willing to serve in their local church and beyond for the sake of the mission of Jesus Christ. When I am at annual conference I really wish we had more time. Yes, a longer conference! More time for the great worship, inspiring preaching, challenging Bible study, learning about ways to be in mission and how people have been reaching out, and time to hear the ideas, prayers, challenges, and convictions of people in our annual conference. Fortunately, the connection of our annual conference goes beyond one weekend in June. Our Virginia Annual Conference is 1,146 churches with 308,490 members, and 1,895 clergy. May Christ connect us to one another in in our shared mission to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

Cathy read the Epistle lesson form 1 Thessalonians 5:12-24, rejoice and pray, and Pastor Joel came to give his message entitled "Sanctifying Grace". Happy Father's Day, he began. Prevenient grace goes before us like the front porch; justifying grace is like the door inviting us in by accepting God's salvation; sanctifying grace is not done with us yet. Bishop Sharma Lewis has once again challenged us to read the Bible, using The 2022 One Year Bible **reading plan** which can be found at http://vaumc.org. The plan has daily readings from Jan 1st – Dec 31st, with about 2 chapters from the Old Testament, some verses from the New Testament, some verses from Psalms, and some verses from Proverbs. Copies of the plan are available in the narthex. Pastor Joel has also made a reading plan for KUMC called "The Bible in a Year". One thing about this plan is it can be started any day, featuring 4 chapters a day, with 2 chapters reading through the Bible beginning in Genesis, 1 chapter from a song, poetry, wisdom, or instruction book of the Bible like Psalms, and 1 chapter from the Gospels or Acts, allowing you to actually read through the Gospels and

The 70 were welcomed and stayed and witnessed that the kingdom of God is near and returned with joy. The harvest is ready, the laborers are few, we are the laborers, will we go? The Affirmation of Faith of Canada was read, before we sang "This Is My Song". Pastor Joel then led the Morning prayer, the invitation to Communion, the Confession and Pardon, and Passing the Peace. Carol Sacra then came forward and was given a blessing for her (and her sister, Gail) Mission Work at the Luray RAM Clinic for the next weekend. The Offertory Prayer and Doxology preceded the Great Thanksgiving and the Lord's Prayer. Carol and Jim Dillard, Bob and Susie Hill, and Becky Ryman and Pastor Joel led the Giving the Bread

JIM HARRIS GIVES THANKS: 1951-1975 A PRE-MINISTRY MEMORY: July 8, 2021: For the past month I have been sharing memories from my 46 years of ministry and the churches that I was blessed to serve, but none of those memories would have occurred had it not been for my home church, Keezletown United Methodist Church. We moved from Cincinnati to Keezletown in 1951, when I was two-and-a-half years old. Our family consisted of my mom, dad, brother Hugh, sister Merle ("Sissy), brother Paul, and me. Paul had cerebral palsy (CP) and getting him and his chair into the church building required help, and the men of the church were right there helping to lift him over the steps and into the sanctuary. They were experienced at this since another person with CP, Don Clatterbuck, was already attending there with his family, who lived just down the road from us. My personal earliest memory of Keezletown Methodist (as it was known then) is of Rev. Tussy's old black sedan driving up our dusty dirt and gravel driveway on Sundays after church for a dinner of fried chicken or roast beef. I do not remember the man or his wife, just his car arriving, and that I asked Mom why he came so often. I do not remember her answer, but she told me many times when I was older that feeding the minister was part of his pay. Our fried chicken was good pay, as it was delicious. My earliest memory from the church itself is of the nursery class taught by Miss Mable. I would talk more about that, but this class is the subject of my devotional that will be in the September/October 2021 issue of the Upper Room. Over the years the Sunday school, Vacation Bible School, youth fellowship, Christmas programs, and many, many other things helped to shape my faith and understanding of Christianity. It was at a Methodist Women's program with missionary Kathryn Eve that I became excited about the work being done in churches in other lands. After that meeting Miss Eye wrote to me that God had revealed to her that I would become a pastor, and in 1984 she was present at my ordination as an Elder. Between then and when I was 23, I struggled with my faith, but the people of KUMC were praying for me, even though I had no idea of that at the time. When my job transferred me to Virginia I moved back home and returned to my home church. It was there that many people, including Pastor Bill Fisher, Alleen Clatterbuck, Linda Michael Liskey and others witnessed to their faith in Jesus and led me to surrender fully to the Lord. Soon I was teaching the Junior High Sunday school class, after which I became a Lay Speaker, and then a pastor. About the two images: when we moved to Keezletown, the
