By God the grace of God, it is small groups that have often done me the most good in my discipleship with Jesus Christ. Sunday school, group Bible study, youth group, FCA, campus ministry Care Group, pastor small groups, and more have been places I got practice in asking questions about God and the Bible, praying, caring for others, planning and doing mission together. Individual practices like prayer and Bible reading have been good for me as well, but God has built my faith most in life together shared with others in faith like in small groups. It is hard to get to prickliest controversies or personal brokenness in a large worship service, but with a few there is space to apply the grace of God in scripture, prayer, and community. In large gathering there is not usually time to hear the glory of what Jesus has done in each person, but with a few there is time to share the goodness of what God has done. I always find such encouragement to hear what God is doing in the lives of others. Acts 2 gives this description of very early Christian life together in Jerusalem: "They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers" (Acts 2:42, NRSV). Acts 2 goes on to say disciples met regularly at the temple (large group) and in homes (smaller groups). A joy for me after the easing of COVID restrictions has been a return to small groups, especially in person, which is how I am most comfortable. Through small groups, God continues to challenge and grow me beyond my comfort levels more towards Christ's love, body, ways, and cross. I am looking forward to being in a small group this Fall. May God bless small group ministry in the Church around the world and at Keezletown UMC, that we may experience life in Pastor Toel Jesus Christ together. _____

Letters the family has found all talk about what a kind man he was. His love and his support constantly showed in his service. He loved gospel quartets, big band music, photography, gardening, water battles with the grandchildren, time with the family, giving surprises, and laughter until he cried. He was a listener, the one last in line, and he prayed for others all the time. His only regret was that he didn't have more time for his family. TWO WAYS TO READ THE BIBLE IN A YEAR

Bishop Sharma Lewis has once again challenged us to read the Bible, using The **2022 One Year Bible** reading plan which can be found at <u>http://vaumc.org</u>. The plan has daily readings from Jan 1st – Dec 31st, with about 2 chapters from the Old Testament, some verses from the New Testament, some verses from Psalms, and some verses from Proverbs. Copies of the plan are available in the narthex. **Pastor Joel** has also made a reading plan for KUMC called **"The Bible in a Year".** One thing about this plan is it can be started any day, featuring 4 chapters a day, with 2 chapters reading through the Bible beginning in Genesis, 1 chapter from a song, poetry, wisdom, or instruction book of the Bible like Psalms, and 1 chapter from the Gospels or Acts, allowing you to actually read through the Gospels and Acts three times in 365 days. YOU CAN BE A LEADER TOO. The melodies of "Sabbath Echoes", "Hope", and "Sunday" welcomed us to worship service on August 7th, as Carol played the gathering

music. The bell rang, Brayden brought in the Light of Christ, and the prelude was "Jesus, the Very Thought of Thee". Mac Coffman assisted today, giving the welcome and announcements, and sharing the opening prayer. Pastor Joel then gave a Conference Report (see next item). The singing of "Rejoice the Lord is King" preceded the reading of the Scripture by Neil Sacra from Judges 2:16-18, Judges delivered the people, and Judges 3:7-11, the Lord saved Israel. "Othniel, Ehud, and Shamgar: When Leaders Change" was the title of Pastor Joel's message that began with "leaders change". Two churches began in Keezletown, one in 1791, one in 1800, and since that time they have had more than 221 pastors in their history. Since 1988, when Don Hawks was here, most have served at least seven years. God raises up human leaders to direct and deliver. Jesus gave as human leaders to help us walk thru faith. When important leaders change, think about how they've helped you grow so that you can share with others. In Judges, the people forget God, take up idols, bring defeat, and oppression, then cry out for deliverance, which God gave. It was a repeating cycle. Othniel was the first good example, filled with the Holy Spirit to empower him. He brought the people back to faithfulness, only to have them turn away again. Ehud was given a word from God. He became an assassin that killed the opposing king, but did not raise anyone up to God. Shamgar was a believer who God raised up to deliver the people from the Philistines. When God calls us up-what gift will He give you to deliver the oppressed? When God is in it, there is great joy in Christian leadership. Mac led the reading of the Niocene Creed, before we sang "I Come with Joy", followed by the Morning Prayer. Pastor Joel then gave the Invitation to Communion, led the Confession and Pardon, and asked all to Pass the Peace. Mac led the offertory prayer and the Doxology. Pastor Joel led the Great Thanksgiving, the Lord's Prayer, and the Partaking of the Bread and Wine. Our closing hymn was "Savior, Like a Shepherd Lead Us" before Mac gave the benediction, Brayden carried out the Light of Christ, and Carol ended the service with the postlude "Spirit of the Living God". VA ANNUAL CONFERENCE REPORT: Pastor Joel thanked everyone for allowing he and Jenn to be the delegates to the June 16th-18th Annual Conference this year. There were 1,146 churches represented. They enjoyed great preaching, passionate worship, singing and dancing, training for Laity, Bible study, ordaining clergy, and many other ways to help in ministry. There were 18,650 kits given, and an offering of \$122,000 given. The 2023 budget was approved at \$27,730,000. Twelve churches closed and three disaffiliated. Team Jeremiah was set up to help on an October 29th Zoom meeting to help the disaffiliation process. There was a protest seeking Judicial Council of the handling of clergy complaint procedures. This was resolved. Statewide districts have been reduced from 16 to 8. DALE'S CORNER by Dale Dodrill

Mark 4: 1-9 PARABLE OF THE SOILS I was reading a `1951 Edition of an International Sunday School Lessons by Earl Douglas. This is my summary of the lesson for January 28, 1951. The various types of soil represents different ways in which individuals hear and respond to Jesus' message. This parable has often been called the parable of the sower. However, since the sower represents God, and the emphasis is upon the soils which represents you and me, the title Parable of the Soils is better for me. Jesus said in verse 3, "Listen to this! A farmer went out to scatter seed." v 4 ", some fell by the wayside, the wayside soil represents people who are an indifferent hearer of God's Word and way. It doesn't matter one way or the other. v 5 "And others fell on the rocky ground", the rocky ground is like people who are here today and gone tomorrow. v 7 "And other fell among the thorns", the thorns represent the worldly hearer of God's Word. The seed sprouts, but things of the world creep in and choke out the growth. v 8 "And other fell on the good ground and yielded fruit", the good soil represents the model hearer of God's Word. They hear the Word of God, accept it, live by it in thought and deed. His Word produces a harvest to his glory and to the advancement of His kingdom and the honor of His name.
