## **OUR PASTOR CHATS**

Maggot Farming...that is what our covenant missionary John NDay in Mozambique said. I got to be in a meeting with John NDay, Chris Cole from KUMC, and some others to learn more about John's priorities at the Cambine UMC Farm Project. KUMC currently has a challenge to raise \$2,000 toward two priorities of expanded irrigation for additional farmland and an egg incubator (total cost of both projects is about \$35,000). John was sharing how different parts of the farm benefit each other for sustainability and providing food for the Cambine orphanage, schools for children, and seminary for pastors. The new thing I heard about was farming maggots. I learned that items which would not be used from the farm and Cambine ministries like leftover litter, manure, and food waste could provide a food source for maggots which grow fast and could be a source of protein for chickens and fish on the farm. I remember a few years ago when John and Florence visited KUMC and shared about how they taught people to make compost for the Cambine Farm and their own gardens and farms since the soil is sandy at Cambine. Adding compost makes the soil much more productive. I remember thinking how it is amazing that God can use something like...compost...to the bless the food resources and health of a community. I was just as amazed when I heard John talk about how God could use maggots! It reminds me how Genesis 2 tells God used some dirt (earth, soil, dust) to make a person. It is a reminder of how God can use quite ordinary (dirt!) and gross (maggots and compost!) things, even a cross and tomb to show God's glory. Paul wrote to the Corinthians, "...God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength. Consider your own call...not many of you were wise by human standards, not many were powerful, not many were of noble birth. But God chose what is foolish in the world to shame the wise; God chose what is weak in the world to shame the strong; God chose what is low and despised in the world, things that are not, to reduce to nothing things that are, so that no one might boast in the presence of God...Let the one who boasts, boast in the Lord" (1 Corinthians 1:25-31 NRSV). May God give us grace to see the foolish, weak, and despised things in our lives, church, and community through which God would show the saving strength of Jesus Christ.

**Bishop Sharma Lewis** has challenged us to read the Bible, using The **2022 One Year Bible reading plan** which can be found at <u>http://vaumc.org</u>. Copies of the plan are available in the narthex. **Pastor Joel** has made a reading plan for KUMC called **"The Bible in a Year"**. One thing about this plan is it can be started any day, featuring 4 chapters a day, with 2 chapters reading through the Bible beginning in Genesis, 1 chapter from a song, poetry, wisdom, or instruction book of the Bible like Psalms, and 1 chapter from the Gospels or Acts, allowing you to actually read through the Gospels and Acts three times in 365 days. #### \*\*\*OCTOBER EVENTS THAT HAPPENED\*\*\*

**DON'T LET THE SPLINTER FESTER**. Worship on October 2<sup>nd</sup> began with Diana playing "Have You Counted the Cost", "Follow the Gleam", and "His Way With Thee" as the gathering music. Pastor Joel called everyone to prepare for Worship, and Diana played "Father, I Adore You" as Beth carried in the Light of Christ. Pastor Joel then gave the greeting and announcements, and led a responsive reading before the Opening Prayer and the first hymn, "How Firm a Foundation". Diana led the Children's Time and talked about how Jesus only gives us the best of His blessings. The choir then sang "What Feast of Love", a hymn to the tune of "What Child is This". Diana then read the Old Testament Lesson from Lamentations 1:1-6 and 3:16-33, the lament of the people. Pastor Joel will be speaking on grief for a few services and began this morning with "Lament and Grief". Grief can be good: we've lost something important that causes us grief, but we can still seek God's grace. He will comfort us. Days of weeping can bring days of joy. Jeremiah wrote Lamentations; he told the people that they would be exiled, that they would live thru it, and would turn to idolatry. He is known as the weeping prophet for he wrote of grief and hopelessness. The Psalms have 54 laments. We don't have to look far to find something in this world to lament and grieve. Lamentations has 5 laments that pour out the grief of the people. The community praved these laments together. Laments end in praise, trusting in the Lord. If you have a thorn or splinter in your finger, it gets infected. Carrying grief is like this, but sharing it with others, helps heal. Wait for the Lord. When we think there are things we cannot get over, we can, if we allow the hope of God to meet us, comfort us, and go with us into the future. The hymn "My Faith Looks Up to Thee", and a responsive Lament followed the message. Pastor Joel then led Our Time of Prayer, the Affirmation of Faith, the Invitation, and the Confession and Pardon, before asking all to Pass the Peace. Today for the first time in a long time, the collection plates were passed, as Diana played "Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing", we sang the Doxology, and Pastor Joel led the Offertory Prayer. He then led the Great Thanksgiving, the Lord's Prayer, and the Giving of the Bread and Cup, as we sang "Rock of Ages" and "There Is a Fountain". The men participating in Emmaus this coming weekend, and those wishing to lay hands on them, were invited to the altar for a blessing as the last hymn, "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms" was being sung. A responsive Benediction was read, and Diana played the chorus to "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms" as Beth carried out the Light of Christ and church family members sang. GRIEF HURTS, BUT GOD HEALS.

<u>"Twelve Women of the Bible" study</u> met at 10:00 a.m. on Oct 5th with 8 women present and Pastor Joel leading. Our video was presented by Amena Brown, who led us thru the struggle that Hannah endured, beginning with being ridiculed for not being able to have a baby, to seeking God, praying, and promising that her first born would be given back to God, namely Samuel, the prophet. Our discussions focused on waiting, not knowing if prayers are answered, how they are answered in different, unexpected ways, and wanting to be in the "there" instead of living in the "here". God is with us all the time, hears all our prayers, and answers in ways that are best for us. <u>WOW MEETINGS BEGIN</u>. October is here and that means Witnessing on Wednesday. Our first meeting was October 5<sup>th</sup> at 6:30 p.m. with the United Women in Faith providing a taco bar, desserts, and drinks. After the meal, Ken Thomas greeted all those present and online, and explained that the offerings taken during these services will go to our covenant missionary John NDay and the two priorities at the Cambine UMC Farm Project in Mozambique of (1) a new irrigation system and (2) an egg incubator. As Diana Davis played, we sang "Father, I Adore You"

and "The Joy of the Lord". Scott Dodrill touched many hearts in the room tonight as he spoke about how a phone call for a wrong part when you are in a bad mood can change your whole day. Especially when the guy on the either end of the phone starts you thinking about what church is. He talked about committees he served on, offices he held, projects he'd helped with, and still asked "Is this my church?" Then his words turned to his family and



the joy they bring him, how he grew up 52 years in KUMC, and how many people had become his Mothers and his family. He then said "This is my church—the caring, giving, Hands of Jesus people that show their love every day". Yes, this is my church. Ken came again to thank the UWF and gave the benediction. The wonderful part of the evening was seeing folks just sitting talking or standing in little groups talking and enjoying being with one another. It's been a long time, and it's good to see it again.

CAMBINE AND THE NDAYS: John and Florence Nday reporting about 5 years to date in the mission service in Cambine / Mozambique: The 2 ministries of the Ndays' couple are: the Cambine agriculture Program with John Nday and the Maternity and child service at Cambine with Florence. The couple completed 5 years of mission service in February. During that time, John helped 300 household/families directly with agriculture training, with each of these families also training their families and 3 neighbors, for more than 1000 families. Infrastructures were rehabilitated and new ones constructed and water for farming was introduced, along with small and big animals, and fish. Irrigation is still insufficient. Many jobs working the farm have been created. John's vision is to continue to produce food for the communities, and to train agriculture. Challenges include getting water, which would require solar water pumps and kits, and drip irrigation; and an egg incubator for 2000 eggs to hatch. Florence is a nurse practitioner for maternity and child service, as well as prenatal consultation, maternity, pediatrics and preschool consultation. Her main challenges are the language barrier, lack of electricity, medical equipment, external toilets, and baby follow-ups. Her vision is for a reduction in mortalities and a reduction in malnutrition. The mission service is not easy, there is a lot of needs in the church and communities that are not responding. Their prayer is for God to help touch people to provide means to run at least the mission work with the Cambine Agriculture Program, and once this is successful, it will contribute at least locally.

<u>United Women in Faith</u>: the District United Women in Faith 49<sup>th</sup> Annual Meeting was held at Dayton UMC on October 6th at 7:00 p.m. KUMC had six ladies attend. After the business part of the meeting, there was a special recognition of departed members which included Susie McGlaughlin, Ellen Layman, and Waltine Simmers. The speaker for the evening was Mary Jane Rawley, who gave a history of the United Women in Faith and the changes from when it began with 8 women in Boston. Awards were presented to outstanding groups, with KUMC receiving a silver certificate. The outgoing President, Barbara Phillips, gave a few remarks, before the meeting was adjourned.

**LIVE, EAT, MULTIPLY, AND PRAY**: "Undie Sunday" began with Chris playing "I'm Gonna Live So God Can Use Me", "I'm a-Going To Eat at the Welcome Table", "I Was There to Hear Your Borning Cry", and "Down to the River to Pray" as the gathering music, and the Bell rang. Pastor Joel gave the Worship preparation and Chris played "Holy Ground" for the prelude, as Brayden brought in the Light of Christ. Pastor Joel gave the Welcome and announcements, before Michele came to talk about the card making project (see next article). The Opening Prayer was led by Pastor Joel, before we

passed the Peace, and sang "Great Is Thy Faithfulness". Dale came to give the Children's message, a story of how puzzle pieces are like our lives, how they go together, how others help us, and how God sees the whole picture of our lives. The choir presented "I Then Shall Live".



Carol read the Old Testament Lesson from Jeremiah 29:1, 4-14, Jeremiah sending a letter. Pastor Joel began the message entitled "Live, Eat, Multiply and Pray" by telling how Jeremiah sent a letter and told the exiles to live, eat, multiply, and pray, while still in exile. Should we be faithful even in something like COVID? Yes, we found a way to continue to share with others thru video worship. Those in exile were told they would have 70 years of hardship. We hope that one day everything will be made new. God brings us life, calls us to faith, to grow the Church, to pray for the peace of God. When your grief is heavy, Jeremiah 29:1 reminds us that God is with us, and throughout our future. The second hymn we sang was "Jesus' Hands Were Kind Hands", followed by the Morning Prayer, and the Lord's Prayer. Artie Frederick from Mission Central then spoke (see article below), followed by the blessing of the undies collected (see totals in article below). Chris played "Freely, Freely" as the offering was collected; the Doxology was sung; and the prayer given. Our closing hymn was "Lift Every Voice and Sing", before the responsive Benediction was led by Pastor Joel. Brayden carried out the Light of Christ as Chris played "Blest Be the Tie That Binds" as the postlude. "I HAVE A PLAN FOR YOU", SAYS THE LORD.

**THANKS FROM MISSION CENTRAL**: Artie Frederick spoke today, "Undie Sunday", for Mission Central. She talked about how much the folks that work there care. A cross within the building says "Love God and Love Your Neighbor". KUMC is like that, she said, and your support is overwhelming. Your hands and feet travel a long way helping the refugees and immigrants from around the world that are helped by Mission Central.
