# **OUR PASTOR CHATS**

"It is hard to understand," is what one person said about the book of Revelation in an introductory session for the study Breaking the Code: Understanding the Book of Revelation. "That was clear as mud," is what another said after a first teaching video. The imagery and style (genre) of Revelation is particularly challenging for many American Christians. Revelation is not the only difficult piece of scripture in the Bible. One of the graces of challenging passages is the reminder that we do faith together. Our difficulty may spur us to seek God's revealing through Jesus Christ, the inspiration of the Holy Spirt, and the insights and learning that comes through group study, group reading, and group wrestling with the scriptures. Another grace is that while there are parts of scripture that are challenging, there are also parts that are quite plain and simple to understand. Those parts of scripture being clear do not mean they are easy to apply. Things like "do justice, love mercy, and walk humbly with God" (Micah 6:8) or "love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you" (Matthew 5:44) are just a few examples. When things in the Bible or even life are "hard to understand" or "clear as mud" I think it can be a good time to focus on what is most clear, even as we wrestle with what is difficult to understand. "God is love" (1 John) and "God is with us in Jesus" (Matthew 1 and John 1) and "Love God, love neighbor, and love yourself" (Mark 12) help us when things are either easy or difficult. The clearest parts of scripture—especially the life, teaching, resurrection, and lordship/servanthood of Jesus Christ—may even help untangle puzzling passages. A good insight from the current Revelation study is the meaning of the first three Greek words which begin the book: "The apocalypse of Jesus Christ". Apocalypse does not translate as disaster or calamity but as "unveiling" or "revealing." So, Revelation is "a revealing of Jesus Christ" and what is most clear about that book is what it says about Jesus and how we may live in faith, hope, perseverance, and confidence in God, even when there is unrest in the world. Is there something difficult for us in the scriptures or world? May it drive us together for the graces of God that we may live and love in the clear ways of Jesus. Pastor Toel

## \*\*\*DECEMBER EVENTS THAT HAPPENED\*\*\*

<u>Longest Night Service</u> was Dec 20<sup>th</sup> at Trinity Presbyterian in Harrisonburg and there were leaders participating from Community Mennonite, Keezletown UMC, Muhlenberg Lutheran, Park View Mennonite, RISE UMC, Shalom Mennonite, Saint Stephen's United Church of Christ, and Trinity Presbyterian. We shared in scripture, prayer, communion, and lighting candles where even in our grief



and longings we could bring our hopes and prayers for God's grace. Pastor Joel had two things that particularly blessed him that night. The first was the Community Mennonite Choir which beautifully sang a few songs acapella. Singing acapella is a regular practice in many Mennonite congregations and it was a blessing to hear their prayers and praise and in that form. A second highlight was how God touched

him during communion. The person serving the bread broke off a piece from a crumbly loaf and handed it to the person serving the cup. The crumbly portion was dipped into the juice in the cup and placed into waiting hands to be taken back to your seat to eat. He had a front row seat and noticed the wood floor which was receiving quite a few bits of bread and drips of juice between the feet of those serving and receiving communion. He was struck by the messiness of the passion of Jesus when he was scourged, beaten, and crucified and how parts of his body and blood touched those who afflicted him but also the ground. Even on that dark Good Friday, Jesus prayed for those first touched by his broken body and blood, "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do" (Luke 23:34). Even during longest nights, the grace of Jesus Christ comes.

IT'S CHRISTMAS EVE! Dec 24th we gathered at 8:00 p.m. to celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ, the Savior. The bell rang and Pastor Joel gave the preparation for worship. Diana played "Do You Hear What I Hear" as the prelude, and Ryan brought in the Light of Christ. Pastor Joel gave the welcome and led the Opening Prayer, followed by the singing of "Hark, the Herald Angels Sing". The Gospel lesson, read by Pastor Joel, was Christ's birth story from Luke 2:1-20. He then spoke on "They Went to See" by talking about the shepherds working in the fields at night, how they received the message, and went to see the Baby Jesus. God wanted the shepherds to know. Angels told them and invited them to go see this gift that was given. We have angels today. God comes to the humble ones, to everyone. We gathered for the 1st Sunday of 2023 on Jan 1st and heard "Love Has Come", "The First Noel", "I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day", and "Once in Royal David's City" played by Chris as the gathering music. He began with talking about the Sears Roebuck catalog that his grandmother gave him to mark the pages of things he wanted for Christmas when he was little (mostly to occupy his time). At Christmas, his expectations for the gifts under the tree were very high and waiting was hard. Though blessed, he really didn't want to open socks and underwear, which he usually got. We have expectations that the sun will come up, church will be open, others behavior will be what we

expect, and that things will happen. We allow hope and dread to imprison us. The sparrow story in the Children's time was me, worrying over my sick cat. I built a wall and put God in a box, not trusting that He could handle it. Our expectations shape who God is and what He can do. We question Him. We trust our expectations instead of trusting what He is already doing. John expects a new ruler, powerful, that will fix everything. In prison, he hears what Jesus is doing, and starts doubting Jesus. He sends disciples to make sure He is the Messiah. We want Jesus to make us strong, but He works in our weakness. If you doubt, look at Scripture and what God is doing in your life. Turn it over to God. Tear down the walls you have built. Jesus finished the work, on the cross, so that we could go thru any trial. We are never alone. Lay your burdens at the foot of the cross and leave them there. We build our prison cells and we hold the key. Open the cell, a whole new world awaits. God will always come to His former inmates. We serve a limitless God. Don't handcuff Him. "What Child Is This" was sung before the Morning Prayer and Lord's Prayer by Ken. Chris played "We Would See Jesus" as the offering was collected; we sang the doxology, and Ken gave the offertory prayer. The closing hymn was "Star-Child", followed by a responsive benediction, led by Ken. Randy carried out the Light of Christ as Chris played "Auld Lang Syne" for the postlude.
