OUR PASTOR CHATS

Wrestling with God for 40 Days in Prayer is a call for Keezletown United Methodist Church to pray like Jacob did when God sneak-attacked him in the middle of the night and Jacob held on until morning, not letting go until God would bless him. It is a call to hold on in prayer for God's direction and next steps to live into our mission as KUMC to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of our community and the world. The 40 days for prayer will be July 16 – August 24, 2023. There are notebooks available at KUMC which were decorated by the youth Sunday school class and they are for writing down thoughts, ideas, and inspiration from God during these 40 days. The Pray Every Day resource will have ways to pray during this time and one thing included are questions to seek after God and which can be journaled about in your notebook. These questions come from Bishop William Willimon and are: Where is the hope for our congregation? Lord, what are your plans for us now? How can our congregation discover what Christ is up to in our neighborhood and how can we hitch on to what Christ is doing? What part of your mission, Jesus, have you assigned to our congregation? How can we stop doing some of the things we have been doing so we can start doing some of the things God wants us to do? What are some appropriate goals and mission strategies for us in this moment? What sort of pastoral leadership is required now to keep up with Christ as he strides into his future? Pastor Joel gave a brief devotion concerning trying to heal any wounds that may have been caused by the disaffiliation discussions or by the possibility of some folks leaving the church, by using kindness and understanding, and by remembering that Jesus will be with us always.

Judy reported for the UWF they had given to Camper scholarships; completed 25 bags for shut-ins for July 4th; would be leading the service on Sept 17th; that there was a need for flowers for the altar; and that the Aug 3rd meeting would be a picnic at Judy's home at 6:30 and that spouses were invited. Scott reported for the UMM a successful chicken BBQ for the outdoor worship service and that \$781 was collected for John NDay. Their next meeting is July 16th. Mike spoke for the Trustees and advised that the ant problem seems to be under control; that the garage needs to be looked at for ant issues; and that the water stains on the sanctuary ceiling seem to be coming from sweating ductwork. A walk thru of the parsonage revealed older items that need addressing, such as carpeting and flooring, and replacement smoke alarms. Scott advised that he needs to replace some switches in the sanctuary (mainly the one that works the light behind the cross) and get some more new fluorescent tubes. Sherry reported for Missions that Relay for Life was a success; that Mike and Sherry delivered 18 flood buckets, 12 Feminine hygiene kits, and 62 health kits to Annual Conference; Vacation Bible School had 14 children and collected \$118 for John NDay. Undie Sunday is coming in August. The UWF will be donating extra school supplies to Camp Overlook. Artie Frederick at MCCC would like us to do school kits for them to give to the young children, which we will collect in August. We are also doing shut in bags, Kingsway meals, and possibly an upcoming gleaning project with another organization. Carolyn reported for Membership that there are a number of blanks after many of the names on the role and she is working hard to try to obtain the information. Cathy spoke for Education and advised that VBS was a success and made an impact. Small group meetings will resume on Aug 1st at 8:45 a.m. Jenny spoke for SPRC and advised that a Pastor review, as well as a review of the work Scott Sprague and Lynn are doing, was completed with all positive findings. Scott is continuing to need a few people to learn how to do the video work—please contact him if interested. Denise Sites was nominated for Chairman of the Safety Committee and was approved. Pastor Joel started his report by suggesting "A Call to Wrestle with God for 40 Days in Prayer" from July 16-August 17, meeting at KUMC to pray on Monday mornings at 10:00 a.m. and Thursday evenings at 7:00 p.m. He continued by saying he was honored to be starting his twelfth year at KUMC. Worship planning has asked that announcements be returned to after the welcome and before the prelude, to allow all to be settled and listening. Our Charge Conference will be Sept 5th; please mark your calendar. Rev Sue MacTavish, pastor at St Paul UMC in Elkton (where Rev Dave Nankivell served), has expressed interest in our congregations doing something together, possibly WOW services. The next meeting date was set for Sept 13th at 7:30 p.m., and the meeting was adjourned.
