OUR PASTOR CHATS

Back in March of 2020 when we were at the beginning of the Covid-19 pandemic Scott Sprague had an idea how to help when people couldn't get to worship in-person. He began leading our congregation in online ministry for worship services. He was not an expert in that field, but he started doing his homework, experimenting, asking for help, and serving. He went from stitching together pre-recorded videos to streaming services online. When he first streamed live worship it seemed he needed the number of limbs of an octopus to run the cameras, computer, sound, and more from a folding table littered with gadgets and set up in front of the first pew. Scott made a way for us to worship online during the newness of Covid-19, for those homebound, for friends from other congregations who couldn't get to church and their church didn't have an online service, for those sick or on vacation or who work on Sundays, for first time visitors and those who would watch for a time online before ever venturing to an in-person service. Scott soon came on staff to help us keep the online service going and set it up where other people could run it, too. He kept learning about cameras, sound, slides, and video to connect us to worship inperson and online. Scott taught other people how to operate the cameras and run the online service. Scott has turned in his resignation for his staff position and will spend the next few weeks helping us make a transition for having the online service without his regular support. Online worship is one of those things I don't think I would have thought necessary if not for the pandemic. It is wondrous how God can bring good things out of bad situations. Praise God for redeeming grace! I have heard many stories of people who have been and are blessed by the online worship service. Scott has given us such a gift and is still giving in helping us continue online worship. This is a ministry that is blessing people and I think it needs to continue for those who cannot or are not quite ready to worship in-person at KUMC. I am praying for new servants of Christ who would be willing to step up to learn and serve with the gifts God will share with them. It may not be exactly like how Scott did it. There is only one Scott Sprague. Just like God used the gifts Scott had and his willingness to serve, God can work in others. Please be praying for God to provide people to help set up the online service and livestream it. Please be in prayer for those who will serve, encourage them in their learning and serving, and seek how God would have you serve at this time-in online ministry or to that something God is calling you. And please give God thanks for these three-and-a-half years of online ministry under the leadership of Pastor Joel Scott Sprague.

Scott reported for the UMM that they met on Sunday Aug 20th; their next project is Sept 10th at the Outdoor worship service by serving hot dogs and drinks; they are looking into working on a lighting project at Camp Overlook at Agape Hill; they will meet again Sept 17th. Judy reported for Patti for Memorials saying that new thank you notes for

all known donations have been written and are ready to send. Ken noted that he had received two of the notes and they were lovely, well written thank you notes. Mike reported for the Trustees that he is working on the smoke detectors for the parsonage. Denise asked if he would have the fire extinguishers and the defibrillator checked. He also mentioned that the kitchen range hood had not been inspected in guite a while and talked with Pastor Joel about who to contact. Sherry reported for Missions that they met on Aug 22nd. Up to this date we have taken an UMCOR offering, had the UWF picnic, had an Ice Cream Social with about 70 people attending, and had the Undie Sunday dedication of underwear for MCCC. Lynette will be beginning the Backpack project to start on Sept 8th. Sherry will announce the beginning of the Hygiene closet collection on Sept 10th at the Outdoor Worship. On Sept 15th, Ronda Williams and a group from the Wellspring Church in Williamsburg will stay overnight at KUMC to glean an apple orchard on Sept 16th; we will need to provide breakfast and possibly help glean. UWF Sunday will be Sept 17th with possibly a salad bar lunch afterwards with a free will offering to go to help Hawaii recover. The UWF will be making cards for Dale Dodrill at their Sept meeting. Upcoming later will be shoeboxes and a Mission interest survey form. Susan reported that Relay for Life will be June 1, 2024. Cathy reported for Nurture/Education the Small Group Meeting on Sept 3rd at 8:45 a.m.; no Sunday School on Sept 10th with the Outdoor service; and Sunday School Kickoff on Sept 17th at 9:45 a.m. Jenny reported for SPRC that they met and discussed staff raises, with Pastor Joel and Jenn and the remaining staff asking that all raises be put on hold this year, due to our financial situation at this time. Denise reported for Safety that she is going to MPC for an Active Shooter Presentation on Sept 12th and will advise what she learns. She is also going to do online courses to become certified. She will also be checking and replacing any necessary items in the first aid box. We decided to have the Harvest Party on Oct 29th, and Jenn was going to check into having a Trunk or Treat Event on Oct 31st. Pastor Joel reported that he will be leading a Romans Study for 12 weeks beginning on Monday, Sept 10th at 10:00 a.m., and Tuesday, Sept 11th at 7:00 p.m. He also wanted to thank all who participated in the Wrestle With God Prayer time during the last two months. He felt the participants were able to talk, pray, heal, and find hope. Susan set the next meeting for Oct 11th at 7:30 p.m. in the Social Hall. Pastor Joel closed with prayer.

HOW BIG IS YOUR OFFERING PLATE? We worshipped on **August 27**th by talking about offerings. The Old Testament lesson was from Romans 12:1-8, telling us to be living sacrifices. some of Advance's tools! The next weekend, I went to a cousin's wedding in NY near NYC. Then I defended my dissertation on July 20th and finished all of my work at the University of Florida. The defense was a 1 hour virtual presentation where I explained the background, methods, results, and conclusion of my final research project. Then I had 1 hour of questions by professors on the committee that decides if I pass. I passed! So, I am unofficially **Dr. Destin Shortell**. If will become official when I complete my 12 month internship at the V A Boston Healthcare System. On July 31st. Mom, Dad, and I drove to Boston over two days, and they helped me clean the place and get furniture for it from Goodwill. It is VERY expensive in Boston, and I am glad I am only here for at least 1 year. It is very clean, pretty, and green though so I am thankful for that. I live near two parks and a pretty college campus, which are great for running. I am looking forward to the fall because I have not seen the leaves change in 5 years! After helping move in, my

parents, boyfriend, and I went to a family cabin in upstate NY at Lake Sacandaga. The rural mountains are much more to my taste, but it was quite cold there during the mornings and evenings! I got to swim, boat, sit by campfires, and read a lot. It was a great break from the stress of moving. Now I am back in Boston and start work at the V A Hospital on 8/14. I will be working with veterans with concerns about their thinking/memory, testing how their brains work with school—like tots, and diagnosing based on how they do. I will see a lot of patients with seizures, strokes, and Alzheimer's, which really interests me.

FOR THOSE WHO HUNG CLOTHES ON THE CLOTHESLINE OR STILL DO:

<u>MOMMA'S CLOTHESLINE RULES</u>: Clotheslines must be wiped before hanging clothes. Socks must be hung by their toes. Hang sheets and towels on the outside line so you can hide your "unmentionables" on the inside lines. Clothes must hang in order—whites with whites and hung first, as they are washed. Shirts must always hang by the tail—never the shoulders. Line up the clothes so that each item shares one of the clothes pins with another item. Except the mens' pants that have the stretchers in the legs to make them straight. It doesn't matter if it is sub-zero outside, the clothes will go out and just freeze dry. Clothes pins must be gathered up and put in the clothespin bag when taking down the clothes—never leave them on the line.

Forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. What would it look like if you added up what you owe to God? How about what you owe to others? Imagine every sin as debt. Pastor Joel led the Children's time and talked about what the Church is. He was also assisted today by Barrett, who led the service, Cathy, who read the scripture, and Ryan, Scott, and Kelli, who led the music with their guitars. Our children also began to really feel the strain of attending school in the Broadway district, away from the Christian friends they knew from church. We had begun to look for a local youth group to provide that peer support for them when COVID hit and all things shut down. All of our searching halted and was replaced by a passion for engaging KUMC in COVID-friendly worship in an online platform - something that could keep us connected and Christ-focused in an uncertain time. However, the love and connection we felt with our church family kept us on a course to worship at KUMC. It has become crucial for us to recognize the importance of our entire family connecting with a local church throughout the week in a meaningful way. While we've been focused on our children's desire to engage with local youth and participate in youth activities, we also understand the significance of our entire family being part of a congregation near our home. This decision isn't solely about supporting our children; it's about strengthening our family's ties within our local community. Together, as a family, we'll be exploring a

local Broadway area congregation as we enter this new chapter in our lives. This Sunday (September 10) will be the last time Ryan, Becca, and Kelli will be sharing in worship with our KUMC family. Scott will linger a few extra weeks to finalize some training for those who will carry on the online ministry and to complete the sound system installation to ensure the church's success in this area. In true Sprague fashion, we will wrap up our family's time at KUMC with some singing at Sunday's service! Goodbyes are rarely easy. We don't look forward to parting but we are so very grateful for the privilege of growing with you in Christ and are looking forward to sharing all we've learned at our new church.
