OUR PASTOR CHATS

Susan Threewitts came to Church Council in October with an old letter from Johnny Cook of Sugar Grove, West Virginia, who gave us the cross that is displayed outside on the front of the social hall. Here is that letter: Greetings Brothers and Sisters in the Name of Jesus Christ. I have been lead by the Holy Spirit to give you this cross, in which the Lord blessed me to make. Thus saith the Lord. I can do all things in Christ which strengthens me. May the Spirit of the Lord be



poured out like a river over all of you and everything you do. In Jesus name Amen. Your Brother in Christ Jesus, Johnny Cook. What a great gift, prayer, and blessing! The cross came to us with a good clear coat on it but after a couple years outside in the sun it had weathered a bit. Kennis and Carolyn Armentrout took on the task of giving the cross a fresh coat. Kennis asked, "Can I paint it?" I wondered what color Kennis was thinking about. He shared, "White." White is a color that comes up a good bit in Revelation and one of the images for that color is victory. When Christ or the saints are clothed in white in Revelation it is a picture of the victory of God over persecution, death, and despair. White is often a color for Easter because of Christ's resurrection and victory over sin and death. I thought Kennis picked a good color so in that strange symbol of the cross, "the emblem of suffering and shame" (From "The Old Rugged Cross" by George Bennard),

we find God's saving grace and power in Christ's love poured out for sinners. So, Kennis painted the cross white. Carolyn painted the lettering black with the words, "JESUS IS LORD". "Jesus is Lord" is why we as Christians are not afraid to do like Jesus did: to forgive sins, to welcome the stranger, to feed the hungry, to pray to God, to share the good news of Jesus, to love God and our neighbors as oneself. Kennis and Carolyn really made the cross stand out with the fresh coat of paint. Johnny really blessed us with the gift and blessing prayer he shared. Susan Threewitts blessed me by sharing that old letter with me again. May we find joy in sharing in all that is possible through the grace of Jesus Christ.


