OUR PASTOR CHATS

2025 is a special year for remembering and sharing in the unity of the Church. It is the 1,700th anniversary of the Council of Nicaea from which we received the Nicene Creed which is shared by Christians around the world. It is also a year in which the Eastern (Orthodox) and Western (Roman Catholic and Protestant) Church observed the same date for Easter Sunday. Today as I write this, it is the day that Pope Francis died and many of our Roman Catholic brothers and sisters are mourning and will be in a time of transition as a new pope will be selected and introduced soon. Let us pray for them and bless them. I want to share with you a long excerpt from John Wesley's sermon "The Catholic Spirit" by which he means the spirit of unity in the people of Jesus Christ. "But although a difference in opinions or modes of worship may prevent an entire external union, yet need it prevent our union in affection? Though we can't think alike, may we not love alike? May we not be of one heart, though we are not of one opinion? Without all doubt we may. Herein all the children of God may unite, notwithstanding these smaller differences. These remaining as they are, they may forward one another in love and good works" Wesley recognized that Christians will have a variety of opinions and modes of worship but what unites us is Jesus Christ our Lord. I really like this anonymous quote to guide us as Christians in our life together with other Christians in areas of disagreement, "In essentials, unity. In nonessentials, liberty. In all things, charity." We are certainly called to love one another as Jesus has loved us (John 13:31-35). Let us have charity (love) in all things to others, including Christians of different opinions than we are. Jesus said, "By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another" (John 13:35). Pastor Toel

Follow Me, trust Me, obey Me, says the Lord, and I will heal you. Next, they were led to a place of twelve springs and seventy palms, one for each tribe, with much abundance. God, struck the stone and sweet water poured out. God does not give up on hurt people; He keeps giving grace so we can trust and obey. God pours out grace upon grace. Hurt people hurt people, healed people heal people. <u>Gathering Non-Perishable Food items:</u> Drop off items at KUMC for our local food pantry. Non-perishable foods and hygiene items are welcome. Items are distributed through Massanutten Presbyterian Church for residents of Keezletown, Penn Laird, and McGaheysville. The pantry is open 2^{nd} Mondays from 10-11 AM and 2^{nd} Thursdays from 7-8 PM.

<u>Serving Meals to Kingsway Prison Ministry</u>: Karen Mooney is leading preparing a meal each month for this ministry. Please contact her if you can help or donate.

<u>US Disaster Response</u>: For United States disaster relief designate your gift to "UMCOR US Disaster Response: Advance #901670." For international disasters please designate your gift to "UMCOR International Disaster Response: Advance #982450."

<u>Mission Central Equipment for Caring</u>: The medical equipment loaner closet loans out and receive donations of (1) durable medical equipment like hospital beds, wheelchairs, walkers, canes, bedside commodes, etc. and (2) disposable supplies like adult diapers, briefs, and wound care items. It is open Mondays 5-7 PM and Thursdays 9-11 AM. The location is Mt. Tabor UMC in Lacey Spring.

<u>Mission Central Children's Clothes Closet:</u> gives and receives donations of children's clothes including winter coats and shoes from sizes infant to 18 years old. New underwear, socks, and undergarments are also received. It is open 2^{nd} and 4^{th} Wednesday of each month from 10 AM - 1 PM; 2^{nd} and 4^{th} Thursdays of each month from 4-7 PM; and 3^{rd} Tuesdays of each month from 4-7 PM.
