TODAY, JULY 21st, I AM CELEBRATING 50 YEARS AS PASTOR JIM HARRIS!



In April of 1975, Rev. Gene Woolridge, Harrisonburg District Superintendent, called to tell me, "I think I have an appointment for you." I was stunned, as I hadn't yet attended License to Preach School. He explained that the charge was part-time, consisting of two churches in Burketown, just outside Weyers Cave along US Route 11. One of them was a small building near the highway in southern Rockingham County, Pleasant Grove United Methodist Church, and Bethany UMC, just two miles south of

Pleasant Grove, still on Route 11, in Augusta County. I was totally surprised. Two churches. A sacred calling, and me, 26 years old and a sophomore art major at JMU as well as the Camera and Jewelry Manager at K-Mart. I had a little over a year of experience as a lay speaker on the Harrisonburg District. I would not be able to start until I'd received my license. License to Preach School would run for three weeks from late June through mid-July. If I completed it successfully, my ministry would begin on Monday, July 21st, and my first sermon as an actual pastor would be Sunday, July 27, 1975, fifty years ago this coming Sunday. I couldn't have asked for a better beginning. Pleasant Grove and Bethany were perfectly suited for a young, freshly called pastor. Long after my five years as their pastor, Pleasant Grove merged into Bethany, and the former Pleasant Grove UMC is now a Pentecostal congregation.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL: (July 22nd-24th from 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m.)
A BIG THANK YOU to all those who helped to make our Lost and Found VBS so successful this year! The pantry is open $2^{\rm nd}$ Mondays from 10-11 AM and $2^{\rm nd}$ Thursdays from 7-8 PM.

<u>Serving Meals to Kingsway Prison Ministry</u>: Karen Mooney is leading preparing a meal each month for this ministry. Please contact her if you can help or donate.

<u>US Disaster Response</u>: For United States disaster relief designate your gift to "UMCOR US Disaster Response: Advance #901670." For international disasters please designate your gift to "UMCOR International Disaster Response: Advance #982450."

<u>Mission Central Equipment for Caring</u>: The medical equipment loaner closet loans out and receive donations of (1) durable medical equipment like hospital beds, wheelchairs, walkers, canes, bedside commodes, etc. and (2) disposable supplies like adult diapers, briefs, and wound care items.
